Programs/Measures

- Familiar with Federal and State waivers to assist during response.
- Lack of clarity surrounding Federal and State roles, authorities, and actions.

Communications/Information Sharing

- Generally understand information sharing between emergency management, energy offices, and other partner agencies
- Public information is amongst the top priorities across states, includes pre-scripted messages for some, integration of emergency management, and public information officers/joint information systems. Lack of clarity on integration for some.
- Social media and rumor control need to be further considered for rapid response.

External Coordination

- Strong established relationships for some with industry partners, associations, and neighboring states.
- Opportunity to further integrate industry and associations in unified messaging efforts both during and before events.
- Opportunity to formalize petroleum shortage response relationships with neighboring states.





Data/Evaluation

- Understand data is critical and have identified some avenues to obtain.
- Identified new ways of acquiring data and data analysis through partners (e.g. GasBuddy).
- Need to know more about the data available, how it can be used.
- Best practices for data monitoring practices could be helpful.
- Data protection, understanding state regulations, federal resources/assistance, limitations.

Regional Coordination

- Acknowledged instances in which incidents would be best handled with collaboration from regional partners. Open to enhancing regional coordination.
- Do not have a standard plan for regional coordination and/or regional standardization.
- DOE/Energy Assurance Coordinator Program presents opportunity for added coordination, information sharing, and capacity when resources are limited.





Interdependencies

- Knowledgeable of the interdependencies and potential cascading impacts across sectors.
- Its not just infrastructure, its also planning for human capital that can be challenging.
- Associations and industry best know their own needs and need to be part of an ongoing preparedness campaign and after action process.
- Ensure plan integration between public and private sector.





Prioritization

- Prioritization will have to be a collaboration between industry and state partners.
- Unsure of methodology for prioritization that would be implemented in different scenarios.
- Challenges with both "Minimum Purchase" and "Odd-Even" programs, while options, most felt public messaging and education is the preferred method of managing scarcity.
